RESOLUTION NUMBER R - 280313 ADOPTED ON JUL 13 1992

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE MUNICIPAL PRIMARY ELECTION AND THE SPECIAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION HELD IN THE CITY OF SAN DIEGO, ON JUNE 2, 1992.

WHEREAS, a municipal primary election was held in the City of San Diego on Tuesday, June 2, 1992, pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 0-17743 (New Series), for the purpose of nominating candidates; and

WHEREAS, a special municipal election was held in the City of San Diego on the same date, pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 0-17744 (New Series) adopted February 24, 1992, which special election was consolidated with the state primary election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of San Diego seven propositions:

One proposition to amend Sections 12, 24 and 40 of the Charter of the City of San Diego (Proposition A); one proposition amending Charter Section 12 (Proposition B); one proposition amending Charter Sections 4 and 5 and adding Section 5.1 (Proposition C); one proposition adding Charter Section 32.1 (Proposition D); one proposition adding Charter Section 225 (Proposition E); one proposition pertaining to ratification of a transfer of a portion of Mt. Soledad Natural Park to a private non-profit corporation (Proposition F); and one proposition (advisory vote only) pertaining to allocation of proceeds from the San Diego County Regional Justice Agency's half-cent sales tax for police services (Proposition G), as follows:

Amends Section 12 of the City Charter to prohibit any person from serving more than two consecutive four-year terms as a Councilmember from any particular district, commencing with elections in 1992. Provides that if for any reason a person serves a partial term as Councilmember from a particular district in excess of 2 years, that partial term shall be considered a full term for purposes of this term limit provision.
