WHEREAS, nearly two-thirds of all invalid calls originate from commercial alarms; and

WHEREAS, nearly two-thirds of all alarm permits are residential but account for only about one-third of the total annual invalid alarm calls; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager recommends a Residential Alarm

Permit fee increase from twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) to fifty
five dollars (\$55.00) for processing and enforcement costs; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager recommends a Commercial Alarm

Permit fee increase from fifty dollars (\$50.00) to ninety-five

dollars (\$95.00) for processing and enforcement costs; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager's recommended fee schedule will recover approximately seventy-two percent (72%) of the processing and enforcement costs; and

WHEREAS, full cost recovery is not recommended at this time because of concerns that it may place too great a burden on permit holders; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of The City of San Diego, that the City Manager is hereby authorized to increase the biennial Alarm Permit Fee from twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per permit to fifty-five dollars (\$55.00) for a residential permit, and from fifty dollars (\$50.00) to ninety-five dollars (\$95.00) for a commercial permit, the exact amount of which shall be maintained in the City Clerk's composite rate book pursuant to San Diego Municipal Code section 33.3706.
