#### **RESOLUTION NUMBER R-289448**

### ADOPTED ON NOVEMBER 18, 1997


WHEREAS, Pardee Construction Company, Applicant, and Project Design Consultant, Engineer, filed an application for a 18 lot vesting tentative map located east of El Camino Real and south of Derby Downs Road, and described as Lot 1 of North City West Neighborhood 7, Unit No. 16A, Map No. 13302, in the Carmel Valley Community Plan area, in the proposed SF-3 zone, and

WHEREAS, on August 14, 1997, the Planning Commission of The City of San Diego approved and recommended adoption by the City Council of Vesting Tentative Map No. 96-0550 for Carmel Valley Neighborhood 7, Unit No. 16A, and

WHEREAS, the matter was set for public hearing on November 18, 1997, testimony having been heard, evidence having been submitted, and the City Council having fully considered the matter and being fully advised concerning the same, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of The City of San Diego, that this Council adopts the following findings with respect to Vesting Tentative Map No. 96-0550:

1. The map proposes the subdivision of a 3.1-acre site into 18 lots (17 residential, one non-building site) for residential development. This type of development is consistent with the General Plan and the Carmel Valley Community Plan which designate the area for residential use. The proposed map will retain the community's character by encouraging orderly, sequential development compatible in its intensity with surrounding existing and future land development.



- 2. The design and proposed improvements for the map are consistent with the zoning/development regulations of the SF-3 zone in that:
  - a. All lots have minimum frontage on a dedicated street which is open to and usable by vehicular traffic, as allowed under a Carmel Valley Planned District Development Permit (CVPD).
  - b. All lots meet the minimum dimension requirements of the SF-3 zone, as allowed under a CVPD.
  - c. All lots are designed so that required improvements do not result in nonconforming lots in respect to building area, setbacks, side yard and rear yard regulations, as allowed under a CVPD.
    - d. Development of the site is controlled by CVPD Permit No. 96-0550.
- 3. The design and proposed improvements for the subdivision are consistent with State Map Act section 66473.1 regarding the design of the subdivision for future passive or natural heating and cooling opportunities.
- 4. The site is physically suitable for residential development. The harmony in scale, height, bulk, density, and coverage of development creates a compatible physical relationship to surrounding properties for which this area has been planned.
- 5. The site is suitable for the proposed density of development. This is consistent with the community plan, which provides for residential uses.
- 6. The design of the subdivision and the proposed improvements could cause substantial environmental damage or substantially and unavoidably injure fish or wildlife or their habitat. However, the project as revised now avoids or mitigates the potentially significant

environmental effects based upon the findings in Mitigated Negative Declaration No. 96-0550, which is included herein by this reference.

- 7. The design of the subdivision and the type of improvements will not likely cause serious public health problems inasmuch as needed public services and facilities are available or required by condition of this map to provide for water and sewage facilities, as well as other related public services.
- 8. The design of the subdivision and the type of improvements are such that they will not conflict with any easements, acquired by the public at large, for access through or use of property within the proposed subdivision as demonstrated by the City Engineer's request for public dedications and adequate improvement on the proposed subdivision map.
- 9. The City Council has reviewed the adopted Housing Element, the Progress Guide and General Plan of The City of San Diego, and hereby finds, pursuant to Section 66412.3 of the Government Code, that the housing needs of the region are being met since residential development has been planned for the area and public services programmed for installation, as determined by the City Engineer, in accordance with financing and environmental policies of the City Council.

The above findings are supported by the minutes, maps and exhibits, all of which are herein incorporated by reference.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the recommendation of the Planning Commission is sustained, and Vesting Tentative Map No. 96-0550 for Carmel Valley Neighborhood 7, Unit

No. 16A, is hereby granted to Pardee Construction Company, subject to the conditions attached hereto and made a part hereof.



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# CONDITIONS TO VTM 96-0550 (APPROVED BY CITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION NO. R-289448)

- 1. This tentative map will become effective with City Council approval and will expire three years thereafter.
- 2. The final map shall conform to the provisions of CVPD Permit No. 96-0550.
- 3. Compliance with all of the following conditions shall be assured, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, prior to the recordation of the first final map, unless otherwise noted.
- 4. The "General Conditions for Tentative Subdivision Maps," filed in the Office of the City Clerk under Document No. 767688 on May 7, 1980, shall be made a condition of map approval. Only those exceptions to the General Conditions which are shown on the tentative map and covered in these special conditions will be authorized.
  - All public improvements and incidental facilities shall be designed in accordance with criteria established in the Street Design Manual, filed with the City Clerk as Document No. 769635.
- 5. "Basis of Bearings" means the source of uniform orientation of all measured bearings shown on the map. Unless otherwise approved, this source will be the California Coordinate System, Zone 6, North American Datum of 1983 (NAD 83).
- 6. "California Coordinate System" means the coordinate system as defined in Section 8801 through 8819 of the California Public Resources code. The specified zone for San Diego County is "Zone 6," and the official datum is the "North American Datum of 1983."
- 7. Every final map shall:
  - a. Use the California Coordinate System for its "Basis of Bearing" and express all measured and calculated bearing values in terms of said system. The angle of grid divergence from a true median (theta or mapping angle) and the north point of said map shall appear on each sheet thereof. Establishment of said Basis of Bearings may be by use of existing Horizontal Control stations or astronomic observations.
  - b. Show two measured ties from the boundary of the map to existing Horizontal Control stations having California Coordinate values of Third Order accuracy or better. These tie lines to the existing control shall be shown in relation to the California Coordinate System (i.e., grid bearings and grid distances). All other distances shown on the map are to be shown as ground distances. A combined factor for conversion of grid-to-ground distances shall be shown on the map.



- 8. The approval of this tentative map by the City of San Diego does not authorize the subdivider to violate any Federal, State, or City laws, ordinances, regulations, or policies, including, but not limited to, the Federal Endangered Species Act of 1973 and any amendments thereto (16 USC Section 1531 et seq.).
- 9. The subdivider shall comply with the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program as specified in Environmental Impact Report No. 96-0550, satisfactory to the Development Services Manager the City Engineer, which is included herein by this reference.
- 10. The subdivider must provide a geologic reconnaissance report on the subject property to discover and address potential geological hazards. The report must be prepared in accordance with the most recent edition of the City of San Diego "Technical Guidelines for Geotechnical Reports." All slopes shall be constructed in accordance with the provisions of San Diego Municipal Code Section 62.0415 et seq.
- 11. Undergrounding of existing and/or proposed public utility systems and service facilities is required according to San Diego Municipal Code Section 102.0404, Subsection 2.
- 12. This tentative map is within the Carmel Valley Community, for which a Transportation Phasing Plan has been incorporated in the Public Facilities Financing Plan. Contained within this plan are individual traffic facility improvements. Before predetermined thresholds of development may be exceeded, the City Engineer must be satisfied that these improvements are either:
  - a. completed;
  - b. under contract;
  - c. bonded;
  - d. scheduled and funded for construction in the immediate fiscal year of the City's Capital Improvement Program (CIP); or
  - e. scheduled and funded for construction in the immediate fiscal year of the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

The subdivider is advised that issuance of building permits may be limited or otherwise withheld because of unsatisfied thresholds in the phasing plan. The filing of a final map does not guarantee that building permits will be issued for properties within the final map area. A copy of the Carmel Valley Public Facilities Financing Plan may be viewed or purchased at the office of the Facilities Financing Division.

13. Whenever street rights-of-way are required to be dedicated, it is the responsibility of the subdivider to provide the right-of-way free and clear of all

encumbrances and prior easements. The subdivider must secure "subordination agreements" for minor distribution facilities and/or "joint-use agreements" for major transmission facilities.

- 14. Concurrently with the City Council approval of the final map the subdivider shall terminate/amend, accordingly, the Subdivision Improvement Agreement(s), and all associated documents and drawings for N.C.W. Neighborhood 7, Unit 16A, Map 12940.
- The bonds, for this project, will not be released until Engineering Drawings 23207-1-13-D, improvements for El Camino Real, have been "as built".
- The abutter's rights of access relinquished to El Camino Real per N.C.W. Neighborhood 7, Unit 16A Map 12940, shall remain in effect.
- 17. El Camino Real is classified as a four-lane major street and the subdivider shall dedicate right-of-way and provide the following improvements, satisfactory to the City Engineer:
  - Dedicate and construct half width improvements of pavement, curb, gutter, 5-foot wide sidewalk and raised center median between Half Mile Drive and Derby Downs Road.
  - ii. Dedicate and construct improvements, north of Derby Downs Road, to provide appropriate transition for northbound traffic.
  - iii. Dedicate and construct improvements at Derby Downs Road to provide a southbound to eastbound left-turn pocket.
  - iv. Construct a traffic signal at El Camino Real and Derby Downs Road.

Prior to the completion of the work, the subdivider may request the City Council to establish a reimbursement district for a portion of the construction cost of items iii & iv above, in accordance with Section 62.0208 of the Municipal Code, when the property within the reimbursement district is subdivided or otherwise developed.

- 18. Derby Downs Road is classified as a two-lane collector street. The subdivider shall improve Derby Downs Road, as shown on DWG. 26170-4D.
- 19. Old Camino Real is classified as a residential cul-de-sac. The subdivider shall dedicate a half-width right-of-way of 27 feet plus an additional 7 feet easterly of the centerline to provide for two way traffic and provide a minimum of 24 feet of pavement, curb, gutter and 4-foot wide sidewalk within a 10-foot curb-to-property line distance. The subdivider shall construct the full bulb of the cull-de-sac with a right-of-way radius of 45 feet and a curb radius of 35 feet, all satisfactory to the City Engineer.
- 20. Streets "A" and "B" are classified as residential streets. The subdivider shall dedicate a 56-foot right-of-way and provide 36 feet of pavement, curb, gutter and

4-foot wide sidewalk within a 10-foot curb-to-property line distance. Street "A" cull-de-sac bulb shall be constructed with a right-of-way radius of 45 feet and a curb radius of 35 feet, all satisfactory to the City Engineer.

- 21. The subdivider shall construct pedestrian ramps at street intersections.
- 22. All unit driveways shall provide a 20 foot minimum depth behind the sidewalk to allow for two standard size vehicles to parallel park, without encroaching into the sidewalk area or an 18 foot depth behind sidewalk with roll up garage doors.
- 23. Lot 18 is a non-building site and shall be owned and maintained by the Homeowner's Association.
- 24. All walls and their footings shall be located outside of the City right-of-way.
- Prior to the recordation of the first final map, the subdivider shall enter into a bonded landscape maintenance agreement, agreeing to maintain all landscaping and appurtenances, within the City right-of-way, adjacent to and within this subdivision until a landscape maintenance district, property owner's association or other such mechanism is established and assumes maintenance responsibility, satisfactory to the City Engineer.

The subdivider shall obtain an encroachment removal agreement for all landscape and appurtenances within the City right-of-way.

- The landscape shall be designed and constructed in accordance with the Landscaping Technical Manual.
- 27. The water, sewer, and drainage easements can be abandoned at the fair market value as established by the Real Estates Assets Department.
- 28. Water Requirements:
  - a. Prior to the preparation of any public improvement drawings, the subdivider shall provide an on-site water study satisfactory to the Water Department Manager. The study shall plan the pressure zone(s) necessary to serve this development including pressure regulating stations.
  - b. The subdivider shall install all facilities required in the accepted water study necessary to serve this development. Water facilities, as shown on the approved tentative map, may require modification based on the accepted water study.
  - c. The subdivider shall install a 24-inch water pipeline in El Camino Real from Half Mile Drive to Derby Downs Road, satisfactory to the Water Department Manager.
  - d. The subdivider shall install fire hydrants at locations satisfactory to the Fire Department and the City Engineer. If more than two (2) fire hydrants

and/or thirty (30) dwelling units are located on a dead-end main then a looped system shall be installed.

## 29. Sewer Requirements:

- a. Prior to the preparation of any public improvement drawings, the subdivider shall provide a sewer study, satisfactory to the Metropolitan Wastewater Department Manager, for the sizing of gravity sewer mains and to show that the existing and proposed facilities will provide adequate capacity and have cleansing velocities necessary to serve this development and the drainage basin in which it lies.
- b. The subdivider shall install all facilities as required by the accepted sewer study, necessary to serve this development. Sewer facilities, as shown on the approved tentative map, may require modification base on the accepted sewer study.

## 30. Water and Sewer Requirements:

- a. The subdivider shall design all public water and sewer facilities to the most current edition of the *City of San Diego Water & Sewer Design Guide*. If facilities do not meet the current standards, then such facilities shall be private.
- b. The subdivider shall provide evidence, satisfactory to the Water and Metropolitan Wastewater Departments' Managers, indicating that each unit will have its own water service and sewer lateral or provide CC&Rs for the operation and maintenance of on-site private water and sewer mains that serve more than one unit. Also, provide private easements for the private mains.
- c. The subdivider shall grant adequate water, sewer, and/or access easements, including vehicular access to each appurtenance (meters, blow offs, air valves, manholes, etc.), for all public water and sewer facilities that are not located within public rights-of-way, satisfactory to the Water and Metropolitan Wastewater Departments' Managers. Vehicular access roadbeds shall be a minimum of 20 feet wide and surfaced with suitable approved material satisfactory to the appropriate Department Manager. Minimum easement widths: water mains with services or fire hydrants 24 feet, sewer mains with manholes 20 feet. The easements shall be located within single lots. No structures or trees shall be installed in or over any easement prior to the applicant obtaining an encroachment removal agreement.
- The drainage system proposed for this development, as shown on the approved tentative map, is subject to approval by the City Engineer.
- Prior to the issuance of any building permits, the developer shall demonstrate compliance with the North City West School Facilities Master Plan. Compliance may be evidenced through either of the following methods: (a) by otherwise

demonstrating the availability of school facilities to accommodate residents of the subdivision; or (b) by participating in the "School Deposit Procedure" alternative, as provided in the Master Plan. A development agreement may be required, as provided in the North City West School Facilities Master Plan to implement the deposit procedure.

This subdivision is in a community plan area designated in the General Plan as Planned Urbanizing. As such, special financing plans have been, or will be, established to finance the public facilities required for the community plan area.

Therefore, in connection with Council approval of the final map, the subdivider shall comply with the provisions of the financing plan then in effect for this community plan area, in a manner satisfactory to the Planning Director. This compliance shall be achieved by entering into an agreement for the payment of the assessment, paying a Facilities Benefit Assessment (FBA) or such other means as may have been established by the City Council.

34. This tentative map is a vesting tentative map. As such, the subdivider shall pay an additional \$300 fee to the Development Services Department for each final map processed in connection with this vesting tentative map.

#### FOR INFORMATION:

This development may be subject to payment of School Impact Fees at the time of issuance of building permits, as provided by California Government Code Section 53080(b) (Statutes of 1986, Chapter 887), in accordance with procedures established by the Director of Building Inspection.

This vesting tentative map will be subject to fees and charges based on the rate and calculation method in effect at the time of payment.
