RESOLUTION NUMBER R- 292111 ADOPTED ON SEP 1 4 1999

WHEREAS, in 1998, according to Federal Railroad Administration statistics, 431 people were killed and 1,303 seriously injured in 3,508 highway-rail grade crossing collisions, and 536 people were killed and 513 were injured while trespassing on railroad right-of-way and property; and

WHEREAS, Operation Lifesaver is a non-profit, nationwide public education program dedicated to reducing crashes, injuries and fatalities at intersections where roadways meet railways and along railroad right-of-way; and

WHEREAS, in this state, California Operation Lifesaver [CAOL] strives to increase public awareness about the danger at places where the roadway crosses the train tracks and on railroad right-of-way, and to improve driver and pedestrian behavior at highway-rail intersections by encouraging compliance with traffic laws relating to crossing signs and signals; and

WHEREAS, CAOL emphasizes the enforcement of existing laws, consolidation and closure of redundant highway-rail crossings, and engineering improvements, including installation and upgrading of crossing warning devices and signs; and

WHEREAS, trains cannot stop quickly, in fact, the average freight train traveling at 55 mph needs approximately 5,260 feet or 1 mile stopping distance, and an 8-car passenger train needs 6,000 feet or 11/8 miles to stop when traveling 79 mph; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Council of The City of San Diego, that this Council, for and on behalf of the people of San Diego, does hereby proclaim Saturday, September 18, 1999, to be

"Operation Lifesaver Day" in San Diego, in recognition of the outstanding efforts to educate the public through outreach programs and increase awareness at railroad crossings.
