AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 5, ARTICLE 1, DIVISION 1 OF THE SAN DIEGO MUNICIPAL CODE BY AMENDING SECTIONS 51.0101, 51.0102, 51.0103, AND 51.0104; REPEALING SECTION 51.0105; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SECTION 51.0106 TO 51.0105; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SECTION 51.0107 TO 51.0106; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SECTION 51.0109; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SECTION 51.0109; AMENDING AND RENUMBERING SECTION 51.0110 TO 51.0108; AND REPEALING SECTION 51.0111; AMENDING CHAPTER 5, ARTICLE 1, DIVISION 2 BY AMENDING SECTIONS 51.0202, 51.0203, AND 51.0204 ALL RELATING TO PUBLIC EMERGENCY PROCEDURES AND UNFAIR PRICING PRACTICES.

WHEREAS, the City of San Diego Office of Homeland Security (OHS) has developed updates to the public emergency procedures in the San Diego Municipal Code (Municipal Code); and

WHEREAS, these updates address concerns discovered in a 2014 performance audit of OHS; and

WHEREAS, these updates align the public emergency procedures of the Municipal Code with the California Office of Emergency Services recommended best practices and reflect the City's change to a Strong Mayor form of government; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the City of San Diego, as follows:

Section 1. That Chapter 5, Article 1, Division 1 of the San Diego Municipal Code is amended by amending sections 51.0101, 51.0102, 51.0103, 51.0104, repealing section 51.0105, amending and renumbering section 51.0106 to 51.0105, amending and renumbering section 51.0107 to 51.0106, amending and renumbering section 51.0108 to 51.0107, repealing section

51.0109, amending and renumbering section 51.0110 to 51.0108, and repealing section 51.0111 to read as follows:

Article 1: Public Emergency Procedures

Division 1: Public Emergency Procedures

§51.0101 Purposes

The purposes of this Article are to provide for the preparation and carrying out of plans for the protection of persons and property within the City of San Diego in the event of an emergency; the direction of an emergency organization; and the coordination of the emergency functions of the City with all other public agencies, corporations, organizations, and affected private persons. This Article is intended to comply with the California Emergency Services Act, California Government Code section 8550 *et. seq.*

§51.0102 Definitions

As used in this Article, the terms *state of emergency*, *local emergency*, and *state of war emergency* have the same meanings as in California Government Code section 8558, as may be amended.

§51.0103 Disaster Council Membership

The City of San Diego Disaster Council is created and shall consist of the following:

- (a) The Mayor, who shall be Chair and also the Director of Emergency Services;
- (b) The Chief Operating Officer, who shall be Vice Chair;
- (c) The Executive Director of the Office of Homeland Security;

- (d) Such Chiefs of Emergency Services as are provided for in a current emergency plan of this City, adopted pursuant to this article; and
- (e) Such representatives of civic, business, labor, veterans, professional, or other organizations having an official emergency responsibility, as may be appointed by the Chair with the advice and confirmation of the City Council.

§51.0104 Disaster Council – Powers and Duties

The City of San Diego Disaster Council shall develop and recommend for adoption by the City Council, emergency and mutual aid plans and agreements and such ordinances, resolutions, rules, and regulations as are necessary to implement such plans and agreements. The Disaster Council shall meet upon call of the Chair, or, in the Chair's absence from the City or inability to call such meeting, upon call of the Vice Chair, at least three times each calendar year.

§51.0105 Powers and Duties of the Chair and Assistant Chair of the Disaster Council

- (a) The Chair is empowered to:
 - (1) Request the City Council to proclaim the existence or threatened existence of a *local emergency* if the City Council is in session, or to issue such proclamation if the City Council is not in session.

 Whenever a *local emergency* is proclaimed by the Chair, the City Council shall take action to ratify the proclamation within seven days of the proclamation or the proclamation shall have no further force or effect.

- (2) Request the Governor to proclaim a *state of emergency* when, in the opinion of the Chair, the locally available resources are inadequate to cope with the *local emergency*.
- (3) Guide the effort of the emergency organization of the City for the accomplishment of the purposes of this Article.
- (4) Direct cooperation and coordination of services and staff of the emergency organization of the City and resolve questions of authority and responsibility within the emergency organization.
- (5) Represent the City in all dealings with public or private agencies on matters pertaining to a *local emergency*.
- (6) In the event of the proclamation of a *local emergency*, the proclamation of a *state of emergency* by the Governor of California or the Director of the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, or the existence of a *state of war emergency*, the Chair is empowered:
 - (A) To make and issue rules and regulations on matters reasonably related to the protection of life and property; provided, however, such rules and regulations must be confirmed at the earliest practicable time by the City Council;
 - (B) To obtain vital supplies, equipment, and such other properties found lacking and needed for the protection of life and property and to bind the City for the fair value thereof and, if required immediately, to commandeer the

- same for public use within the confines of the San Diego Charter and state law;
- (C) To require emergency services of any City officer or employee and to command the aid of as many citizens of the City as necessary in the execution of these duties; such persons shall be entitled to all privileges, benefits, and immunities as are provided by state law for registered disaster service workers;
- (D) To requisition necessary personnel or material of any City department or agency; and
- (E) To execute all of the special powers conferred upon the

 Chair by this ordinance or by resolution or emergency plan
 adopted by the City Council, all powers conferred upon the
 Chair by any statute, by any agreement approved by the
 City Council, and by any other lawful authority.
- (b) In the event the Chair is unavailable or is otherwise unable to perform the assigned duties during a *local emergency*, *state of emergency*, or *state of war emergency*, individuals listed in this subsection who hold permanent appointments to the following positions automatically serve as Chair of the Disaster Council, in descending order:
 - 1) the Chief Operating Officer,
 - 2) the Assistant Chief Operating Officer,
 - 3) the Deputy Chief Operating Officer-Infrastructure/Public Works,
 - 4) the Police Chief,

- 5) the Fire Chief, or
- the Executive Director of the Office of Homeland Security.

 The succession of an individual to the position of Acting Chair of the Disaster Council is subject to City Council approval at the next scheduled Council Meeting. The succession pertains only to the duties and responsibilities of the Chair of the Disaster Council as defined in section 51.0105(b) and does not address vacancies to the Office of the Mayor.
- (c) The Vice Chair shall, under the supervision of the Chair and with the assistance of the Executive Director of the Office of Homeland Security, the Police Chief, and the Fire Chief, manage the emergency programs of the City and shall have such other powers and duties as may be assigned by the Chair.

§51.0106 Emergency Organization

All officers and employees of the City, together with those volunteer forces enrolled to aid them during a *local emergency*, *state of emergency*, or *state of war emergency*, and all groups, organizations, and persons who may by agreement or operation of law, including persons impressed into service under the provisions of section 51.0105(a)(6)(C) charged with duties incident to the protection of life and property in this City during such emergency, shall constitute the emergency organization of the City of San Diego.

§51.0107 Emergency Operations Plan

The City Office of Homeland Security shall be responsible for the development and updating of the City of San Diego Emergency Operations Plan, which shall provide for the effective mobilization of all the resources of the City, both public and private, to meet any *local emergency*, *state of emergency*, or *state of war emergency*, and shall provide for the organization, powers and duties, services, and staff of the emergency organization.

§51.0108 Punishment of Violations

It shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or by imprisonment for not to exceed six months, or both, for any person, during a *local emergency*, *state of emergency*, or *state of war emergency*, to:

- (a) Willfully obstruct, hinder, or delay any peace officer or any member of the emergency organization in the enforcement of any lawful rule or regulation issued pursuant to Chapter 5, Article 1, Division 1, or in the performance of any duty imposed upon the peace officer or any member of the emergency organization of the City pursuant to Chapter 5, Article 1, Division 1.
- (b) Do any act forbidden by any lawful rule or regulation issued pursuant to Chapter 5, Article 1, Division 1, if such act is of such a nature as to give or be likely to give assistance to the enemy or to imperil the lives or property of inhabitants of the City, or to prevent, hinder, or delay the defense or protection of the City.
- (c) Wear, carry, or display, without authority, any means of identification specified by the emergency organization of the City.

Section 2. That Chapter 5, Article 1, Division 2 of the San Diego Municipal Code is amended by amending sections 51.0202, 51.0203 and 51.0204 to read as follows:

Article 1: Public Emergency Procedures

Division 2: Emergencies and Major Disasters; Unfair Pricing Practices

§ 51.0202 Purpose

It is the intent of the City Council to ensure that citizens are protected from excessive and unjustified increases in the prices charged during or shortly after a declared *state of emergency*, *local emergency*, or *state of war emergency* for goods and services that are vital and necessary for the health, safety, and welfare of consumers. This ordinance shall apply when there is a proclamation of a *state of emergency*, *local emergency*, or *state of war emergency* declared by the President of the United States or the Governor, or executive officer or body of the City of San Diego. This ordinance shall also apply to declarations of a *state of emergency*, *local emergency*, or *state of war emergency* outside the jurisdiction of the City of San Diego which causes excessive and unjustified increases in the prices of goods and services vital and necessary for the health, safety, and welfare of consumers within the City of San Diego.

§ 51.0203 Definitions

"Consumer food item" through "Goods" [No change in text.]

§ 51.0204 Unlawful Pricing Practices

(a) Upon the proclamation of a *state of emergency*, *local emergency*, or *state*of war emergency, and for a period of 30 days following that declaration,

it is unlawful for a person, contractor, business, or other entity to sell or

offer to sell any consumer food items or goods, goods or services used for

emergency cleanup, emergency supplies, medical supplies, home heating oil, building materials, housing, transportation, freight, and storage services, or gasoline or other motor fuels for a price of more than 10 percent above the price charged by that person for those goods or services immediately prior to the proclamation.

However, a greater price increase is not unlawful if that person can prove that the increase in price was directly attributable to additional costs imposed upon it by the supplier of the goods, or directly attributable to additional costs for labor or materials used to provide the services, provided that in those situations where the increase in price is attributable to additional costs imposed by the sellers' supplier or additional costs of providing the good or service during the state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency, the price represents no more than 10 percent above the total of the cost to the seller plus the markup customarily applied by the seller for that good or service in the usual course of business immediately prior to the onset of the *state of* emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency. A business offering an item for sale at a reduced price immediately prior to the proclamation of the state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency may use the price at which it usually sells the item to calculate the price pursuant to this section.

(b) through (c) [No change in text.]

(d) A violation of this section shall constitute an unlawful business practice

and an act of unfair competition within the meaning of section 17200 of

the California Business and Professions Code. The remedies and penalties

provided in this section are cumulative to each other, the remedies under

section 17200 of the California Business and Professions Code, and the

remedies or penalties available under all other laws of this State.

Section 3. That a full reading of this ordinance is dispensed with prior to passage, a

written copy having been made available to the Council and the public prior to the day of its

passage.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force on the thirtieth day from

and after its final passage.

As used in this Article, "emergency" shall mean the actual or threatened existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the public peace, health or safety of persons or property within this City caused by, but not limited to, such conditions as air pollution, fire, flood, storm, epidemic, riot, or earthquake, or other conditions, including conditions resulting from war or imminent threat of war. the terms state of emergency, local emergency, and state of war emergency have the same meanings as in California Government Code section 8558, as may be amended.

§51.0103 Disaster Council Membership

The City of San Diego Disaster Council is hereby created and shall consist of the following:

- (a) The Mayor, who shall be Chairman. Chair and also the Director of Emergency Services;

Any expenditures made in connection with emergency activities, including mutual aid activities, shall be deemed conclusively to be for the direct protection and benefit of the inhabitants and property of the City of San Diego.

§51.01100108 Punishment of Violations

It shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not to exceed <u>five hundredone</u> <u>thousand</u> dollars (\$5001,000), or by imprisonment for not to exceed six months, or both, for any person, during <u>an emergency</u> <u>local emergency</u>, <u>state of</u> emergency, or <u>state of war emergency</u>, to:

§51.0111 Severability

If any provision of this Article or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Article are declared to be severable.

Governor, or executive officer or body of the City of San Diego. This ordinance shall also apply to declarations of a local or national emergency state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency outside the jurisdiction of the City of San Diego which causes excessive and unjustified increases in the prices of goods and services vital and necessary for the health, safety, and welfare of consumers within the City of San Diego.

§ 51.0203 Definitions

"State of Emergency" means an emergency resulting from an earthquake, flood, fire, riot, storm, or other natural or manmade disaster, for which a state of emergency has been declared by the President of the United States or the Governor of California, the executive officer or body of the City of San Diego, or any Governor of any of the United States of America.

"Local Emergency" means an emergency resulting from an earthquake, flood, fire, riot, storm, or other natural or manmade disaster, for which a state of emergency has been declared by the executive officer or governing body of any city or county in the United States.

"Consumer food item" through "Goods" [No change in text.]

§ 51.0204 Unlawful Pricing Practices

(a) Upon the proclamation of a state of emergency as defined in Section

52.0203 <u>state of emergency, local emergency</u>, or <u>state of war emergency</u>,
and for a period of 30 days following that declaration, it is unlawful for a
person, contractor, business, or other entity to sell or offer to sell any
consumer food items or goods, goods or services used for emergency

cleanup, emergency supplies, medical supplies, home heating oil, building materials, housing, transportation, freight, and storage services, or gasoline or other motor fuels for a price of more than 10 percent above the price charged by that person for those goods or services immediately prior to the proclamation of emergency.

However, a greater price increase is not unlawful if that person can prove that the increase in price was directly attributable to additional costs imposed upon it by the supplier of the goods, or directly attributable to additional costs for labor or materials used to provide the services, provided that in those situations where the increase in price is attributable to additional costs imposed by the sellers' supplier or additional costs of providing the good or service during the state of emergency state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency, the price represents no more than 10 percent above the total of the cost to the seller plus the markup customarily applied by the seller for that good or service in the usual course of business immediately prior to the onset of the state of emergency state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war *emergency*. A business offering an item for sale at a reduced price immediately prior to the proclamation of the emergency state of emergency, local emergency, or state of war emergency may use the price at which it usually sells the item to calculate the price pursuant to this section.

(d) A violation of this section shall constitute an unlawful business practice

and an act of unfair competition within the meaning of section 17200 of

the California Business and Professions Code. The remedies and penalties

provided byin this section are cumulative to each other, the remedies

under section 17200 of the California Business and Professions Code, and

the remedies or penalties available under all other laws of this State.
