SUMMARY

THIS IS AN INFORMATIONAL REPORT. NO ACTION IS REQUIRED ON THE PART OF THE COMMITTEE OR THE CITY COUNCIL.

BACKGROUND

In February 2007, Council President Pro Tem Anthony Young invited the Gang Commission Staff and Deputy City Attorney Makini Hammond to join him in a meeting with Aisha Martin Walton, Chief, California Community Relations Service, Office of the Attorney General Crime and Violence Prevention Center.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss implementing the State's Safe Passage Program at Gompers Charter Middle School (GCMS) and Montgomery Middle School. The objective of the program is to create a multi-agency enforcement partnership to provide safety from gang-related crimes students on specific streets, at bus stops and on bus lines immediately around the school one hour after dismissal or before school.

GCMS and Montgomery Middle School had indicated to the City Attorney and the Gang Commission that they wanted to participate in the Safe Passage Program because of gang problems around their school. The Gang Commission voted to support the effort to bring the program to the schools. Council President Pro Tem Young wrote a letter to support the requests of the two schools. Deputy City Attorney Makini Hammond organized the first Safe Passage meetings at the two schools. Gompers High School was included in the early meetings but because the school will be closing and all students will be going to Lincoln High School, the Gompers High School participation in the meetings stopped but the Assistant principal there was still involved in communicating information to Gompers Middle School staff. UJIMA Institute, a community advocacy group, had also been

working on making the area safe around Gompers Middle School and High School students. Members of that organization also became involved in the process.

The State Attorney General's office agreed to facilitate the Safe Passage Program at two middle schools for 12-18 months. The first meetings were held in March 2007. The meetings are held monthly at each school. Chief Martin Walton and her staff facilitate the meetings. Attendees at the meeting include representatives from community organizations (UJIMA and Parents Groups) as well the following agencies:

City Attorney's Office' Drug Abatement Response Team (DART): *to address gang problem properties/locations that may contribute to the unsafe passage for children.*

School Staff: *to be adult presence, take pictures; provide information to law enforcement and school police.*

Metropolitan Transit: *to address safety issues on buses and trolleys.*

Park and Recreation: *to be an adult presence in the park as well as provide information about after school incidents and link with school efforts to identify youth who are problems.*

Fire Department: *to offer visible presence during time children are going to and from school.*

City School Police: *to monitor the perimeter of the school 1 hour after school and at hot spots and to provide monthly citation reports at the meetings.*

San Diego Police Department: *to monitor the perimeter of the school and to provide crime reports at each meeting.*

Commission on Gang Prevention and Intervention: *to link resources to schools.*

Probation: *to provide presence or support when appropriate*

San Diego County Office of Education: *to provide support/link with appropriate organizations as well information*

## DISCUSSION

The Attorney General's office suggested that each school do a survey of students. The principals agreed and the questions asked were about school safety and what the students perceived were the issues around the school (A Detailed Report is attached).

431 students were surveyed at Montgomery Middle School. Of those students, 216 were 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 95 were 7<sup>th</sup> graders and 120 were 6<sup>th</sup> graders.

413 students were surveyed at GCMS. Of those students, 34 were 9<sup>th</sup> graders, 91 were 8<sup>th</sup> graders, 247 were 7<sup>th</sup> graders and 41 were 6<sup>th</sup> graders.

All of the surveyed students indicated that parks were unsafe when questioned about the top unsafe or dangerous places around the schools. At GCMS, 7<sup>th</sup> graders rated the streets as the # 1 unsafe area. Montgomery students rated the parks as the #1 unsafe place near their schools.

A list has been developed at each school as to the areas near the school that the youth feel are unsafe. This list is updated every month. Nuisance properties are reviewed every month as well. For instance, an ice cream vendor no longer parks in front of Montgomery Middle School attracting groups of youth and was a place for recruitment by gang members.

## FOLLOW UP

The Commission on Gang Prevention and Intervention will request with the Attorney General's office to expand the program to more schools. There are 11 such programs in Los Angeles. Over half of the schools have seen an improved sense of safety since implementing the program.

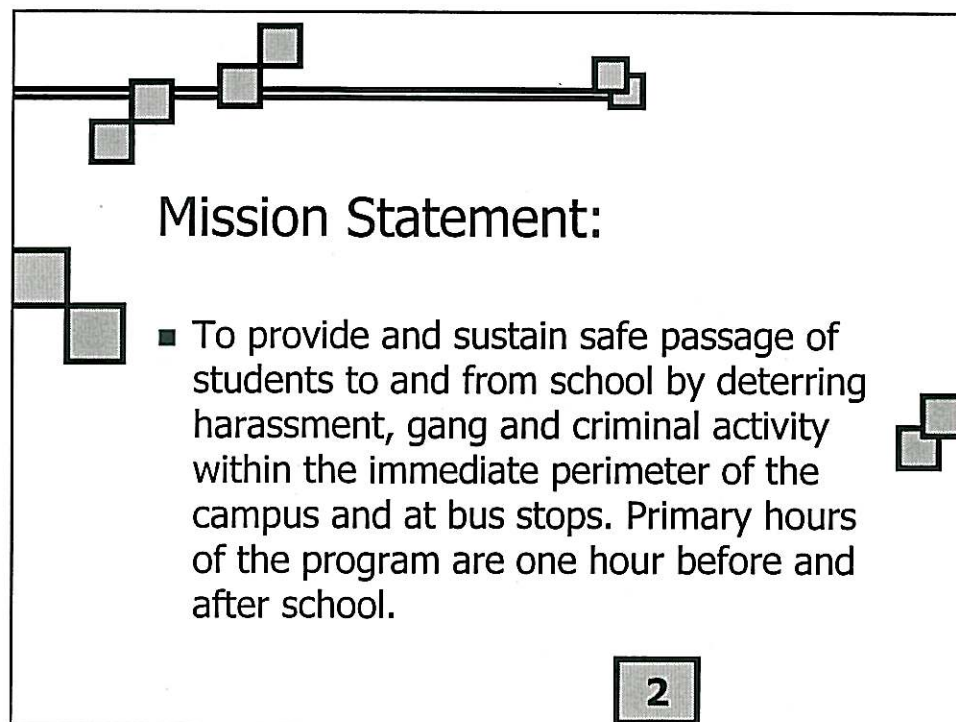
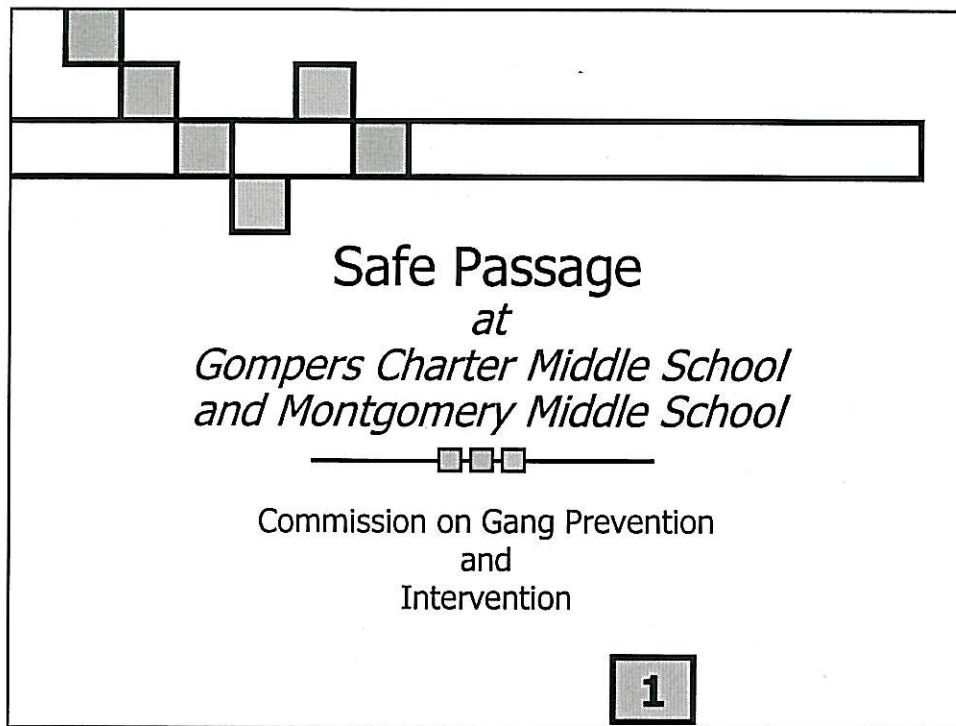
